#### Have You Read Your Rules Lately?

This is a reminder that the Rules and Regulations are in effect and being enforced. All Residents and their guests are expected to know and abide by these rules.

New Rules and Regulations Update-The new rules and regulations were voted on and adopted by the Board of Directors on May 27, 2022.

#### **More Friendly Reminders**

XII. PETS

Note: Pursuant to the ADA and the FHA, a service animal or emotional support animal is not generally considered a pet.

All animals and pets must abide by appropriate Rules and Regulations. Dogs, cats, and birds are allowed, but are subject to the following restrictions:

- 1. Dogs, cats and birds must be registered with the community office.
- 2. A maximum of two (2) pets are allowed per household. A cat cannot weigh more than twenty (20) pounds at full maturity. The following breeds are not allowed: Pit Bull Breeds, German Shepherds, Great Danes, Rottweilers, Bull Mastiff, Akita, Alaskan Malamute, Doberman, Chow-chow, Presa Canario, Siberian Husky, Wolf Hybrids, and mixed breeds which include any of the previously mentioned breeds.

#### XII. PETS (Cont.)

- 3. Lee County Ordinance No. 14-04 outlines animal/pet owner responsibilities in communities where the animal/pet resides. Violations of this ordinance constitute a civil infraction subject to a fine of up to \$500. A copy of the ordinance is available in the community office, and it is recommended that it be reviewed, especially the section on nuisance. Animal/pet owners are responsible for any violation within the ordinance, and a violation of the ordinance shall be deemed a violation of these Rules and Regulations.
- 4. Any approved animal/pet residing in the community must have current vaccinations and be licensed per Lee County Ordinance, including seasonal animals in Lee County for more than 30 days.

- 5. Unless inside a dwelling, all animal/pets must be restrained by a proper leash no longer than eight (8) feet, or a buried electric wire "fence" always.
- 6. No animal/pet may be left unattended outside the home or in common areas (including buildings) even if the owner is present. The animal/pet must be restrained with a proper leash no longer than eight (8) feet in length. A peripheral fence, cage or kennel on an owner's property is not allowed.
- 7. Pets can be walked in the streets only; they are not allowed in clubhouse or pool area.
- 8. Animals/pets are not allowed on the property of another resident, even if restrained, unless the resident has given written permission. Offenders should be photographed, and the resident can file a signed complaint with a photo to the community office.
- 9. If the Co-Op determines that an animal/pet is dangerous, the animal/pet must be removed from the park. A determination by the Lee County Domestic Services that an animal/pet is dangerous is not necessary but will be deemed conclusive evidence that the animal/pet must be removed.
- 10. As provided in the PROCEDURES FOR SOLVING ANIMAL/PET PROBLEMS, any resident perceiving a violation of these Rules and Regulations can file a written and signed complaint with the community office or the community Dog Warden. The complaint is confidential unless disclosure of the complaint is required at any hearing or trial regarding a violation of these Rules and Regulations.
- 11. These Rules and Regulations apply to everyone. Guests may not bring pets into the park.
- 12. Present pets, as of 2/17/2017, are grandfathered.

The pool is open from sunrise to sunset. All guests 14 and under must be accompanied by an adult. If you remove the pool rope that is across the pool separating the deep end to the shallow end, **PLEASE PUT IT BACK**. We will be fined if safety protocol is not followed.

#### **Library**

The library is full of books, puzzles, and games in the clubhouse. Please return them when you are finished.

#### **Billiards**

Be sure to use our new billiards table in the clubhouse. Please respect the rules pertaining to them.

#### **Ice Machine**

The ice cube machine is in the clubhouse. Please use the scooper provided, take maximum 3 scoops, and please close the lid.

#### **Bocce Ball**

Enjoy our bocce ball courts with all the equipment you need near the court located next to the clubhouse parking lot.

#### **Shuffleboard**

Shuffleboard equipment is for everyone's use and can be found in the shed next to the court.

### Storage and Boat Slips

There 41 storage spaces on the premises and 17 Boat slips. All spaces are rented annually and are rented first come, first served. Please contact the office for prices.

#### Clubhouse

The clubhouse is in the heart of the community. It is where we host a lot of our activities. It is available to rent for special occasions. Please contact Denise Miller at 603-493-1719.

#### **Garbage Disposal and Plant Cuttings**

There is a dumpster and plant cutting trailer available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Please do not put large items in the trash compactor. All large items need to be paid for with the proper sticker from the office.

#### **Boat Ramps**

We have two boats ramps in the park. One is located near the office and the other is next to gypsy hall near the RV section. Please do not park trucks or trailers where they will be towed when launching your boat.

#### **Horseshoe Pits**

There are horseshoe courts near the pavilion and pool. Please replace the equipment when done using.

#### **Fishing Pier & Fish Cleaning Station**

There is a fishing pier available to all residents on the NW side of the park. Please obey all fishing regulations and dispose of your used fishing line in the proper waste bin that is available at the pier. There is a fish cleaning station in the RV park that has a cutting surface and running water. Please dispose of your fish carcasses appropriately.

#### **Dog Park**

For your convenience there is a fenced in dog park open 24 hours a day, 7 days a week for your pets. There are dog waste bags and bins. **PLEASE** clean up after your pet.

# Do Not Put FROG Into the Drain!

Help us prevent fats, rags, oils and grease clog/blockages in the sewer system. Raw

or partially treated sewage can back up into homes or flow into the streets, rivers, and bay. Do not put the following items down the drain:

Food scraps, butter, margarine, cooking oils, sauces, dairy products, greasy leftovers. Facial tissues, baby wipes, disinfectant wipes, moist wipes, toilet bowl scrub pads, napkins, paper towels, dental floss, eggshells, nutshells, bones and coffee grounds, hair, sanitary napkins, tampons, condoms. Vitamins, medicines, sheet plastic, or plastic of any kind, diapers. The best recommendation for toilet paper is that it is made from 100% recycled materials.



#### We Recycle on Fridays

Please place your handle towards your house and the open side toward the street for proper pickup!

#### **Recycle Smart-5 For the Cart:**

**Paper**-junk mail, newsprint, magazines, copy paper, phone books, etc. **DO NOT** put in used paper towels, tissues, napkins.

**Metal cans**-aluminum or steel (tin) cans. No need to remove labels or crush cans.

**Cardboard**-Any kind of box unless it held a liquid (such as those to hold milk, juice, wine, and broth). Pizza box lids can be recycled, the bottoms can be recycled if they do not have any food residue on them.

Plastic Containers-Look for the number 1-7 within the recycle triangles on the bottom of the container (no Styrofoam, no plastic bags) Lids can be either on or off. Glass-green, brown, and clear bottles and jars. Literature provided by Lee County Southwest Florida website leegov.com

#### **HISTORY OF GROUNDHOG DAY**

The Pennsylvania Dutch were German-speaking immigrants who settled in Pennsylvania. They developed their own take on the legend of Candlemas in the 18th and 19th centuries, bringing with them the custom of the native Groundhog as their annual weather announcer. Candlemas involved the clergy blessing and distributing candles needed for winter. The Pennsylvania Dutch transformed the idea by selecting an animal to predict their needs for winter.

The first-ever Groundhog Day was created by a local newspaper editor Clymer Freas around 1886, who convinced Groundhog hunter and local businessman, and all members of his Punxsutawney Groundhog club on the idea of Groundhog Day. Together, they all made their way to Gobbler's Knob where the Groundhog

would make the final decision on the weather. Today, a group called the inner circle who wear top hats, conduct the official proceedings on February 2 in a Pennsylvania Dutch dialect, where tens of thousands of people attend the day's events every year.

Studies have proven no strong correlation between a Groundhog spotting its own shadow and the arrival of spring subsequently. According to German lore, the badger known as Dachs is their forecasting animal. A separate version of traditions states that clear weather on the holy Christian day of Candlemas would often prohibit winter being prolonged.

Groundhog lore suggests much about Punxsutawney Phil. It is said that he drinks a magic "elixir of life" every summer, giving him seven more years to live. He has been predicting since around 1886, and a badger's life span is around six years roughly, so go figure. There is also supposedly only one Phil and any other groundhogs who attempt to do what he does, are imposters. He is said to speak to the club president on the day, in front of the crowds in Groundhogese which is understood and then translated.



# February is American Heart Month, a time when all people can

when all people can focus on their cardiovascular health.

With so many Americans affected by heart disease, it's important to make sure you know how to lower your risk. Keep the following heart-related facts in mind this month so you can learn healthy habits for the future.

- Ten minutes of exercise helps your heart.
   Getting ten minutes of activity can lower your risk of a heart attack significantly.
- Less screen time is heart healthy.
   If you tend to spend four or more hours per day sitting in front of your TV, computer, or other device, your risk is double of having a heart attack.
- 3. Heart disease starts early. Heart disease starts when you are a teenager or young adult. Being obese as a child can make the risk even higher when you become an adult.

- **4. Stress and heart disease go hand in hand.** Find ways to reduce stress, such as deep breathing and keeping your anger in check.
- **5.** Heart disease is an ancient disease. CT scans done on mummies shows it was around in ancient Egypt times.
- 6. More sleep is better for your heart.

  Women who get less than five hours of sleep, have a 39 percent chance higher risk.
- 7. Laughter protects your heart.
  Laughing helps relax your blood vessels and expand them.
- 8. Mondays are the worst for heart attacks.
- Heart disease fatality rates are high.
   25,000 people die in the U.S. from heart disease every day.
- 10. Age is the biggest risk factor.

Although heart disease can develop in your younger years, other factors include high blood pressure, high cholesterol, diabetes, smoking, a sedentary lifestyle. You can't control certain factors, such as family history, but making healthy choices can help reduce your risk overall.

### **Hurricane Preparedness**

It seems like we just got through the hurricane season, but the best time to begin preparing for a hurricane is long before the official hurricane season begins on June 1. Many of us have lived through it, but it never hurts to learn a little more. Let's start with understanding the hazards typically associated with hurricanes:

- While hurricanes pose the greatest threat to life and property, tropical storms and depression also can be devastating. The primary hazards from tropical cyclones (which include tropical depressions, tropical storms, and hurricanes) are storm surge flooding, inland flooding from heavy rains, destructive winds, tornadoes, and high surf and rip currents.
- Storm surge is the abnormal rise of water generated by a storm's winds. This hazard is historically the leading cause of hurricane related deaths in the United States. Storm surge and large battering waves can result in large loss of life and cause massive destruction along the coast.
- Storm surge can travel several miles inland, especially along bays, rivers, and estuaries.
- Flooding from heavy rains is the second leading cause of fatalities from landfalling tropical cyclones. Widespread torrential rains associated with these storms often cause flooding hundreds of miles inland. This flooding can persist for several days after a storm has dissipated.
- Winds from a hurricane can destroy buildings and manufactured homes. Signs, roofing material, and other items left outside can become flying missiles during hurricanes.
- Tornadoes can accompany landfalling tropical cyclones. These tornadoes typically occur in rain bands well away from the center of the storm.
- Dangerous waves produced by a tropical cyclone's strong winds can pose a significant hazard to coastal
  residents and mariners. These waves can cause deadly rip currents, significant beach erosion, and damage to
  structures along the coastline, even when the storm is more than 1,000 miles offshore.

It is vital to understand your home's vulnerability to storm surge, flooding, and wind in order to be prepared.

#### **Know your Evacuation Zone**

Hurricane evacuation zones are no longer referenced by storm category, but are now named by hurricane surge evacuation zones: A, B, C, D and E. We want you to know your zone, and to challenge your friends and family to know the same! In Lee County, we are evacuated by zones for storm surge and wind, in a phased manner. This means we may order the evacuation of zone A before you see any effects of the tropical storm. Orange Harbor Mobile Home and RV Resort is in Zone A due to our location right along the river and canals.

#### Check emergency equipment

Now is a great time to be sure you have basic emergency items readily available. Check items such as flashlights, generators and storm shutters now, rather than waiting until the pressure is on.

#### Write/Review your Family Emergency Plan

Sit down with family or close friends and decide how you will get in contact with each other, where you will go, and what you will do in an emergency. Keep a copy of this plan in your emergency supplies kit or another safe place where you can access it in the event of a disaster.

#### **Review your insurance policies**

- Check your policies so you know what is covered;
- Flooding is the leading cause of damage from tropical systems, if possible, make sure you have flood insurance. You can visit floodsmart.gov to learn more about flood risk and flood insurance options;

#### Why People Have Difficulty Driving at Night

Humans are born with two types of photoreceptors in their eyes: rods and cones. In the daytime, we utilize cones — the structures that allow us to see color. With the onset of night, however, we shift to a mix of rods and cones; in very, very low light, we rely entirely on rods — which is why, in the darkness, everything appears black and white. When you age you start to lose rod photoreceptors before you lose cone photoreceptors. So, while our vision in daylight may be just fine, our night vision becomes less acute. In people with age-related macular degeneration, this process is even more pronounced.

At the same time, our pupils, which regulate how much light enters our eyes, shrink with age. The older we are, the smaller our pupils are. Even for the same light level, there's less light getting inside our eyeballs. By the time we hit our 60s, the backs of our eyes are receiving only one-third the light they did when we were 20. The world just gets darker, day by day. The only reason we don't notice it is because it's so gradual. As we age, we also become less sensitive to changes in contrast and thus less able to distinguish objects — like road signs or pedestrians — from their background.

And the darker it gets, the more challenged our sight becomes, especially when it's a question of spotting objects along the side of the road. A study by the University of Michigan Transportation Research Institute found that pedestrian fatalities were 22 percent more likely to occur on nights when there was a new — and essentially invisible — moon than on brighter nights with a full moon. Plus, in low-contrast conditions, it's difficult to estimate how fast objects, such as other cars, are moving, and our reaction times are slowed.

What's more, by the time we reach our late 50s, nearly 1 in 10 of us will suffer from cataracts — a blurring caused by a buildup of protein on the disclike lenses behind our pupils. By the time we hit our 80s, more than half of us will have cataracts.

#### How to See Better in the Dark

Driving as little as possible after dark is safety tip number one. But sometimes, especially when the days grow shorter, that simply isn't an option. To maximize your vision:

- Use your brights at night in almost all cases, except when there are oncoming cars. Drivers often don't see as well at night as they think they do, and high beams give them the best chance of reacting fast enough to an unexpected hazard.
- 2. Don't economize. When buying a new or used car, look for models with top-rated headlights (go to <u>iihs.org/ratings</u> to find a car's safety ratings). When given a choice, opt for the best headlights available.
- 3. If your car is several years old, consider getting your headlights and casings replaced. A 2018 study by AAA found that in at least two popular sedan models, degraded headlights and yellowed headlight casings meant that on low beams, the headlights were emitting just 22 percent of the light that new ones would provide, making night driving more hazardous.
- 4. Keep your windshield and headlights clean, for obvious reasons.
- Reset the illumination levels of your dashboard lights and any in-car screens to low. Bright light inside makes it harder to see outside.
- 6. Don't skip the after-dinner coffee. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration reports that in 2017, 91,000 police-reported crashes involving drowsy drivers.

Golf Carts vs Bicycles and Pedestrians
Please remember that golf carts and bikes must follow the same "rules of the road" as cars and other motor vehicles. Golf carts need to stay on their side of the street, stop at all corners, and proceed into an intersection after carefully looking both ways. There have been way too many "near misses" on our streets involving cars, bicycles, and pedestrians, with drivers not following the "rules of the road". Please follow the speed limit of 15 mph on our streets and stop at all STOP signs for the safety of our residents.

Pedestrians, please use a flashlight at night on your evening walks for your safety and others.



#### **Need to Know**

Residents who own waterfront lots are allowed to build and maintain docks, floating docks, and boat lifts.

Any alterations to existing structures or new construction must abide by local, state, and federal laws regarding these types of structures.

All residents' docks are personal property of the resident, and maintenance and general liability are the sole responsibility of each resident with a dock attached to their lot whether or not the current resident built, changed or acquired existing dock through resale.

No additional utility outlets or services shall be permitted on docks/floating docks/boat lifts without prior approval of Management.

Consideration should be given to neighbors when constructing boat lifts.

A plan must be submitted to the office prior to dock and boat lift construction. Authorization and inspection is required for all boat docks/floating docks.

Permits are required from the county office.

If the resident does not maintain the structure and the structure is falling down or causing a hazard to the surrounding waterway, the Co-op shall remove the structure and bill the resident for the expense.

# "ARC" Architectural Review Committee

Applications are required for ANY changes affecting the exterior of the residence. Applications must be submitted 30 days prior to the start of the work. Work cannot commence without ARC approval. All work shall commence within 90 days of approval. Any changes or modifications must be submitted to the Arc committee for review and consideration. Homeowners must comply with all local and state building codes and obtain permits as required. When using a contractor, the homeowner must obtain the business license, Certificate of Insurance (COI) showing coverage for Liability and Workman's Compensation (Certificate Holder must show Orange Harbor Co-Op Inc. on the COI) Any unapproved or non-complying improvements may be subject to enforcement procedures, including but not limited to the demand of removal, imposition of fines, and/or legal injunctions at the homeowner's expense.

All trailers and boats must be removed from your carport from January 1 to April 30. Please see the office for annual storage rental spaces available on site. We have a few annual Boat Slips available immediately.

The Orange River is an "Idle" zone river all season long. The definition of that is as follows:

 "Idle Speed, No Wake" Zone: A designated area where vessels must be operated at a speed no greater than that which is necessary to maintain steerage and headway. The vessel should not produce a wake at this speed.

The Caloosahatchee River has a "slow wake" from November 15 to March 31. The definition of that is as follows:

 Slow-No Wake means operating a boat at the slowest speed necessary to maintain steerage and reduces or eliminates waves that appear as white water behind the boat. the same location frequently.

Reliable, easy-to-use video platforms like Zoom have helped to restore the ability to hold meetings during difficult times. The challenges and benefits of Zoom meetings can be much different than in-person meetings. The advantage of virtual meetings is the ability to hold them almost anywhere and have more people participate from anywhere, but there are dos and don'ts associated with participating in a Zoom meeting.

#### ✓ Zoom "Best Practices"

- ✓ You should try to attend the meeting from a quiet area that has a neutral background.
- ✓ Eliminate distractions-noises (dog barking, dishwasher, voices in the background, TV, etc.) and movement going on around you.
- ✓ Wear proper attire-not your pajamas or go shirtless.
- Avoid distracting behaviors-ironing, eating, moving around, etc.
- ✓ Don't do private things-brush or floss your teeth, shave, etc.

REMEMBER: THE CAMERA SEES EVERYTHING & EVERYONE ON ZOOM CAN SEE YOU. While we like to see everyone, you do not have to participate using video to attend a Zoom meeting. You do not have to have your camera on to see what is going on at the meeting either. Another option is to just cover up your camera lens at the top of the screen with a post-it note. If you choose to have your camera on, aim the camera 'straight' at your face (not from a position that looks up your nose) and try to follow the Zoom "best practices".

#### **Gate Tutorial**

To protect our residents and protect our gate codes, there is a simple way for all of us to let in our guests, contractors, vendors, etc. At the front gate there is a pin pad kiosk. Every resident has their own special code listed on the directory of the kiosk. If you would like to find your code, you can go to the gate, hit the # symbol continuously until you find your name which are in alphabetical order. When you see your name there will be a four-digit number behind your name. Memorize that number! When you must allow entry for someone just have them go to the kiosk enter your four-digit number on the pin pad. Your phone will ring, and your caller ID will show Orange Harbor Office. At this point, answer the call and you will be able to communicate through your speaker on the phone and the speaker on the kiosk. You then will press the number 9 on your phone, repeatedly, if need be, and the gate will open. If you do not want to look for your special code, your visitor can follow the steps on the pin pad of the kiosk. If you have any questions, please stop in, or call the office.

- Do not use the pool if ill with diarrhea.

# Did you Remember to Renew your Mobile Home?

# DECAL RENEWAL PERIOD The registration period for mobile homes is January 1st through December 31st.

The annual expiration date is December 31st. It is the responsibility of the mobile homeowner to renew their decal(s). When renewing decals, if you have a single-wide mobile home you will be issued one decal. In the case of a double or triple-wide mobile home, one decal will be issued per side. Regular mobile home decals (on colored backings that rotate color each year) are issued to mobile homes on rental property. These decals expire every year, or every 2 years if renewed biannually. Any attachments to the mobile home are considered personal property. Real Property, or RP, decals (on black backings) are issued to an individual who owns both the mobile home and the land on which it is permanently set up. These decals do not expire and are not required to be renewed.

DISPLAYING DECALS Decals are to be displayed in the lower left-hand corner of the window closest to the street or road which provides access to the mobile home. Decals are to be always visible and are not to be covered by awnings, shutters, foliage, etc.

**HOW DO YOU RENEW?** To renew, visit leetc.com 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. If the Mobile Homeowner fails to renew their decal(s) they will receive a Notice of Impending Court Summons.














# Spring is just around the corner, here are some helpful tips to protect and rejuvenate your garden.

- Apply a pre-emergent weed killer (not a weed and feed) to lawns this month to prevent germination of warm season weed seeds.
- Begin planting warm season vegetables this month. Beans, peppers, cucumbers, tomatoes, and squash can be started while temperatures are cool.
- Inspect irrigation heads and adjust irrigation based on rainfall.
- Orchids show their natural blooms and make an ideal bedroom plant as they are essentially nocturnal and create great oxygen while you are sleeping.
- As your yard begins to emerge from their slight winter dormancy, monitor your garden's moisture paying specific attention to local water management and city codes.
- If you've been thinking about rearranging plants in your garden spaces, now is the time. Be careful to dig around the plant's root system and be certain to replant before the roots begin to dry out. Water sufficiently once replanted.
- This is a great time to add and prune your roses. Keep the plants to 3 to 7 main stems for best growth.
- It may be time to refresh your garden's mulch. Just about any kind is fine, but some gardeners prefer the eucalyptus mulch as it's a Florida product and is plentiful.

#### Please remember No invasive plants are allowed.

The Office has a list of 'Invasive Plants' and 'Florida Friendly Plants' on request.

- Consideration should be given to the estimated matured size of the plant, not to encroach on the
- 5' lot line set back and not to create a hindrance in neighbor sight lines.
- The use of Florida friendly plants is encouraged because they survive Florida weather and require little maintenance.
- Call 811- 3 to 5 days before any digging with a shovel for the free service to have utilities marked. Residents must have written permission from Management to avoid damage to underground facilities and for lawn maintenance considerations.
- No plants or trees can be planted or removed unless written permission is received from Management.



#### **History of the Hobby Club Dolls**

At the Jan. 2, 2024, Hobby Club meeting, Dolly Jones shared some of the background of the dolls. The Hobby Club began making dolls in 1985 during Polly Chase's presidency. Kathryn Dobbins suggested making the dolls and shared the procedure. Her daughter-in-law was a nurse at a local Doctor's office in Immokalee. The dolls were donated to give a young child something to hold when getting a shot or vaccine, hence the 'shot doll' began.

Since 1985, the dolls have been donated to doctor's office, maternity wards, migrant camps, Doctors without Borders, child abuse centers and sent to Africa and Haiti via missionaries in the pockets of pillowcase dresses.

Dolly's mother-in-law made pillowcase dresses. Dolly estimates that over the course of about 5 years she took about 1500 dolls to Michigan to put in the pockets of the dresses. They were given to At Risk families via doctor's office and missionaries. Approximately 2000 were given to Doctors without Borders.

Hobby Club averaged making about 400 dolls a year. In going through some old Hobby Club minutes, we found that in 2015, 200 went to Haiti, 37 to Children's Oncology and 100 to Nicaragua.

Dolly Jones did the research on the dolls and got information from Norma Peronis, Diana Heaton, Shirley Schroeder, and Gail Bower.



#### **Rules of Ownership and Rentals**

ALL SALES AND ALL RENTALS MUST GO THROUGH THE OFFICE. CREDIT AND CRIMINAL BACKGROUND CHECKS TO BE PERFORMED. If you do not follow the proper procedure, you will be in violation of our governing rules and regulations and will be subject to eviction.

- 2. All new residents must go through the application and screening process and be approved by management to be a resident of the community. If the manufactured home is sold to a tenant who is not approved by management, then management reserves the right to terminate the tenancy pursuant to Chapter 723, Florida Statutes.
- 3. All caregivers and renters residing in the community must first go through the application and screening process and be approved by management.
- 4. The Co-op shall limit the number of manufactured homes a resident can own to two (2). Any resident who owns more than two (2) manufactured homes at the execution of these Rules and Regulations shall be permitted to retain ownership of those manufactured homes. Management reserves the right to conduct a credit check for each additional manufactured home purchased by a Resident. The Co-op reserves the right to refuse the sale of additional manufactured homes to current residents based on the criteria established to determine the credit history of Resident.
- 5. The Co-op reserves the right to refuse admittance to any prospective resident or renter based on the criteria established to determine the credit history and criminal background of prospective resident.
- 6. The Co-op reserves the right to require an application fee not to exceed the greater of \$100.00 or the maximum cost allowed under 719.106 (i), Florida Statutes or Chapter 723, Florida Statutes. Management reserves the right to require a processing and screening fee. The failure of any prospective resident or renter to provide general background information, personal references and proof of financial responsibility shall be deemed a cause for refusal of residency.
- 7. The Co-op specifically reserves the right to terminate the tenancy of any tenant pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 723, Florida Statutes, upon determination by the Co-op that the tenant misrepresented or falsified any information on any application or entry forms required by the Co-op prior to admittance as a tenant of the community. In addition, the Co-op reserves the right to terminate the tenancy of a renter if the renter misrepresented or falsified any information on any application or entry forms required by Co-op prior to admittance.

#### Share vs Land Lease

Orange Harbor is a unique community. We are a Cooperative but fall under several different statutes under Florida Law. First and foremost, we are a 617 Not for Profit Corporation.

**Shareholder:** Resident owned mobile home parks and communities in Florida or manufactured home co-op share is ownership interest in the entire mobile home community. You do not own the land that your manufactured home is sitting on (known as fee simple, in traditional real estate). Instead, your ownership is comparable to being a stockholder owning an interest in the entire community. The monthly fees are generally half of the lot rent fees paid on a <u>land</u> lease basis for those homes without a share.

Cooperative properties are listed on the Multiple Listing Service or MLS alongside conventional real estate. When purchasing or selling a mobile home that is part of a co-op you are able to gain massive exposure in both selling your manufactured home or searching to buy your next mobile home.

You pay real estate taxes just as you do on real property. Because the purchase price is relatively low, your taxes are not that high. If you are, or will be a Florida resident, you can homestead the property resulting in significantly lower real estate taxes. Other qualifying reductions in real estate taxes include disability and more. All rules and regulations must be followed. Applicants must be credit checked and background checks must be performed. Florida state statute 719 known as The Cooperative Act is followed.

**Land Lease Owner:** A land lease community is one where the owner of the home leases the land under which the home sits from a third party. The homeowner will need to renew the registration on their home annually. All rules and regulations must be followed. Applicants must be credit checked and background checks must be performed. **Florida state statute 723, known as the Florida Mobile Home Act is followed.**
